Founded in 1932 by the Australian Broadcasting Commission, the Sydney Symphony Orchestra has evolved into one of the world's finest orchestras as Sydney has become one of the world's great cities. Resident at the iconic Sydney Opera House, the Sydney Symphony Orchestra also performs in venues throughout Sydney and regional New South Wales, and international tours to Europe, Asia and the USA have earned the Orchestra worldwide recognition for artistic excellence.

The Orchestra's first chief conductor was Sir Eugene Goossens, appointed in 1947; he was followed by Nicolai Malko, Dean Dixon, Moshe Atzmon, Willem van Otterloo, Louis Frémaux, Sir Charles Mackerras, Zdenêk Mácal, Stuart Challender, Edo de Waart and Gianluigi Gelmetti. Vladimir Ashkenazy was Principal Conductor from 2009 to 2013, followed by David Robertson as Chief Conductor from 2014 to 2019. Australia-born Simone Young commences her role as Chief Conductor in 2022, a year in which the Orchestra makes its return to a renewed Sydney Opera House Concert Hall.

The Sydney Symphony Orchestra's concerts encompass masterpieces from the classical repertoire, music by some of the finest living composers, and collaborations with guest artists from all genres, reflecting the Orchestra's versatility and diverse appeal. Its award-winning education program is central to its commitment to the future of live symphonic music, and the Orchestra promotes the work of Australian composers through performances, recordings and its commissioning program.

ABOUT THE MUSIC

Compassion was borne out of tragic circumstances.

Nigel Westlake's son, Eli, was murdered in 2008 in a road rage incident; a year later, Westlake and his wife, Jan, held a memorial concert, and invited Lior, one of Eli's favourite musicians, to perform. It was a hugely charged and emotional event, and at the end of Lior's set of his own songs, he decided to conclude with an a capella rendition of a Jewish prayer, Avinu Melkeinu, and its message of compassion. Following that performance Westlake and Lior connected over the idea of creating a full orchestration of the hymn. The pair presented the work to the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, which immediately commissioned a full-length work – Compassion, as you hear it tonight.

This symphony of songs unites the soulful power of Lior's voice with the radiance and vivid drama of Westlake's orchestral style. Their theme is the wisdom of compassion expressed through ancient writings and timeless music. Poetic, beautiful and rewarding, this unique collaboration celebrates the liberating power of compassion and kindness, that can bring people together across the divides of race and fear.

Compassion draws from the rich worlds of Islam and Judaism to present a collection of profound and poetic insights into the practice of compassion and its ability to transform our relationships as human beings. It offers listeners space and opportunity to reflect on the qualities of mercy and love, and how they can enrich our lives with meaning, insight, depth and worth.

"Compassion inhabits a vast array of emotions and colours," says Westlake, "at times pulsating and riotous, at others reflective and textural, and draws upon the myriad of influences the two of us have been able to bring to the table from our incredibly diverse backgrounds. With the utmost respect, we have tried to imbue the ancient texts with a contemporary interpretation, adhering to the purity of a single voice and orchestra."

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

LIOR singer/songwriter

Lior is one of Australia's most treasured singer songwriters, renowned for his beautiful voice and songs that radiate truth and sincerity. He burst on to the Australian music scene in 2005 with his debut album, Autumn Flow, which has become one of the most successful independent debut releases in Australian music history. That year Lior earned three ARIA nominations, including Best Male Artist, as well as a J Award nomination from Triple J for Australian Album of the Year. Lior's second album, Corner of an Endless Road, went to #2 on the Australian Albums Chart and topped the Independent charts for several weeks. Lior has subsequently released a further four albums whilst remaining a completely independent artist. He has earned a total of seven ARIA nominations as well as being a two-time ARIA Award winner.

Lior has toured extensively both in Australia and internationally. He has been a regular performer at WOMAD festivals internationally as well as various art festivals around the world including an entire season at the Edinburgh Festival. Lior has also undertaken a host of song-writing work for film and television and is a recipient of an APRA Award (Australian Performing Rights Association) for Best Original Song Composed for Screen.

In recent years, Lior has shown a keen interest in diversification, collaborating on various classical crossover works and theatre projects. In 2015 Lior starred in the Australian production of *Fiddler on the Roof*. In 2016, he completed his first theatre score for *The Wider Earth*, a play tracing the voyage of Charles Darwin. The play premiered at Queensland Theatre Company and went on to become the first ever play to perform an entire season at London's Natural History Museum. Lior received the Matilda Award for Best Original Theatre Score at the Queensland Theatre Awards that year.

In 2019, Lior completed an international tour as the featured guest vocalist for the Australian Chamber Orchestra's *Luminous* concert series. Lior was recently awarded the prestigious Sidney Myer Creative Fellowship, awarded to only nine artists nationally across all artforms for displaying outstanding excellence and courage in their chosen artform.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS

NIGEL WESTLAKE conductor

Nigel Westlake's career, spanning almost five decades, began as a clarinettist touring Australia and the world with many orchestras, ensembles & bands.

He began composing from 1980, receiving offers to write for radio, theatre, circus, TV and film and was appointed composer in residence for ABC Radio in 1984. From 1987-1992 he was a core member of the Australia Ensemble (resident at UNSW) and in 1992 was invited by guitarist John Williams to join his septet Attacca as performer and composer.

His film credits include, Babe, Ali's Wedding, Paper Planes, Miss Potter, Babe- Pig in the City, Children of the Revolution, The Nugget, A Little Bit of Soul, Blueback (2023) and the IMAX films Antarctica, Solarmax, The Edge and Imagine. His television credits include numerous documentaries, telemovies, news themes and station idents.

He has received many awards, including two ARIA Awards, 15 APRA awards across both Classical and Screen categories, the 2022 APRA Distinguished Services to the Australian Screen Award and the Gold Medal for Best Original Music at the New York International Radio Festival.

He is a two time winner of the prestigious Paul Lowin Orchestral prize, in 2013 for *Missa Solis – Requiem for Eli* and in 2019 for *Spirit of the Wild – Concerto for oboe and orchestra*.


In 2020 he was awarded the Albert H. Maggs Composition Award by the University of Melbourne for his third string quartet, *Sacred Sky*.

He holds an honorary doctorate in music awarded in 2013 by the University of NSW and was the recipient of the HC Coombs Creative Arts Fellowship at the Australian National University in 2004.

In 2008 he founded the Smugglers of Light Foundation with his family in memory of his son Eli, to promote cultural awareness and empowerment through education via the mediums of music and film in youth and indigenous communities.
